Message from the Principal

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Ullens School is pleased to present the first edition of the lockdown newsletter. The administration, faculty, and staff are all concerned about our collective safety from this pandemic. I understand students are limited now, under the lockdown restrictions and are missing their regular activities. However, we have been able to facilitate and provide our school community with remote learning which has helped us all cope to some level, and adjust to a new normal.

I am glad our community was able to practice social distancing right from the beginning and started remote learning to assure that students continue their learning. I feel honoured to state that our preparation and response to Covid-19, from conducting emergency contingency planning to engage with the Parent Representatives of the Action Team for partnership before we started online instruction in April 2020, has helped in establishing a balanced routine for online instruction.

I feel proud that we were able to complete the academic year **2019/20** without disturbance and complete the curriculum for all our students. We took the initiation right from the beginning to respond about the safety of our community. We sanitized the whole examination centre for the

safety of our SEE students. We worked actively to ensure students, faculty, and our school community understood the necessary safety measures, by posting awareness posters, and safety instructions. We also provided sanitizers to everyone entering the school compound, installed hand driers in the washrooms, and provided students with additional masks to complete our academic session safely. We provided each and every faculty and admin staff with laptops to facilitate remote learning for the entire school. Our virtual graduation ceremony for our Grade 12 & IBDP students was much appreciated by the students, parents and teachers, and I would like to thank the entire team that worked to make it possible.

Weeks after remote learning was introduced to our students, we sent a survey to parents of students in the Kindergarten and in Grades 1-10, requesting feedback on the online classes. Many of you provided useful feedback to improve the classes, shared appreciation for the teachers' hard work, and showed your concerns about the health and safety of our students.

This newsletter has tried to capture all the activities that were done during lockdown by our school community and clearly exhibits the ability of our management to run without hesitation in these types of emergencies and uncertainties. My heartfelt thank you



to the staff, teachers, parents, students and the overall team that have been helping us maintain Ullens as the center of excellence.

My sincere appreciation to the editorial team for working hard to bring out our first lockdown-issue of our Newsletter. I am sure all the readers will enjoy reading this edition and provide us with feedback for improvements in the days to come.

Current Situation (Covid-19), And How Nepal Has Been Impacted

Almost all the activities of Nepal have been shut down in efforts to slow the transmission of COVID-19 all around the county. Nepal is starting to suffer the most abrupt and widespread cessation of economic activity due to the outbreak of this virus even after locking the economy for about three months. The government has not been able to widen the testing, tracing, tracking (3T) policies to the wider range which are extremely necessary to sustain this pandemic. The impact has already started to surface in a number of sectors like tourism, trade, production linkages, supply and health. Especially the entire service industries: tourism, aviation and hospitality sectors have been hit hard by the outbreak. Foreign employment has not only been addressing Nepal's unemployment issues but has also been contributing significantly to the country's economy in the form of remittance. In the current situation, coronavirus effect on remittances is disastrous. In these two months, the remittance source has contributed less than 1percent in the country's economy. The downturn in remittance has created a severe impact on overall consumption in the country. The situation is alarming. Although we are yet to experience the full impact and aftermath of the coronavirus, this threat has already created economic uncertainty among all of us. Ullens School is also no exception to this. We have been hit hard but have been able to utilize the resources we have and provide our continued service and make the most of the situation.

Ullens Response And Coping:

Ullens School has done a lot for the preparation and response to Covid-19, from conducting emergency contingency planning to engaging with the Parent Representatives of the Action Team for Partnership before starting a new academic session. Our administration has tried its best utilizing its available resources to provide students with all the services we were able to provide.

Survey And Response

Weeks after starting the session we sent out a survey to parents of students in the Kindergarten and in Grades 1-10, requesting feedback. We also asked whether, given the government's recent discouragement of online instruction and request to wait to start the school year, Ullens School should stop online instruction, or continue and keep improving. Among responding parents in Grades 1-10, 95.1% of you clearly asked us to continue. An additional 1.8% said the decision was up to us, 1.3% provided answers that were not clear, while only 1.8% asked us to stop.

Laptop distribution:

School has made the provision to provide laptops to every faculty and admin staff for facilitating remote learning in an effective manner. This step has helped us to encourage us to provide our students with quality services.

Action Team Partnership (ATP) Meetings continue during the lockdown

The Action Team for Partnership (ATP) is the body of Ullens School that strengthens links between the school and parents. All parents' representatives from Grades 1-10, 11-12 and IBDP automatically becomes ATP members. In addition, the Principal of the school, the Parents Coordinator, the UEF CEO, CFO and Communications Directors are also part of the meeting. Parent members serve for 2 consecutive years, after which a new round of submissions is accepted from parents seeking to get involved in school life. Once the ATP is formed, the group itself will determine one Chair and 2 Co-chairs for the group and the duration of their terms.

We have held the Action Team Partnership (ATP) meetings at regular intervals throughout the lockdown period. The main agenda of these meetings have been to enable decision making on how we, as an educational institution, can provide the best possible quality of education to our students during the ongoing pandemic and understand parents concerns.

We would also humbly like to extend our gratitude to all the parent representatives who have been actively participating in these meetings with us and also staying connected with their section's parents. The school is really grateful for your time, constructive feedback and advice and support. We look forward to your continued support.

Alumni in the Spotlight: Mr Chiran Pandey

(May 1, 2020)

Ullens Alum, Chiran Pandey, Class of 2015 who also happens to be an NYU, Abu Dhabi student has been awarded the prestigious Ertegun scholarship to the University of Oxford. He was among one percent of applicants who will receive a full grant, worth Dh 180,000, under the Ertegun Scholarship. More than 1,500 hopefuls applied for the program but places were given to just 15 students from around the globe. Oxford's selection committee only picks the "very best students" who will become "leaders in their chosen fields". Chiran who is on a fully-funded fouryear scholarship to NYUAD will soon travel to the UK in late September to pursue his one-year master's degree in World Literatures in English.

Prasiddhi Shrestha speaks to the IB team

On May 26, 2020, the IB team had a guest speaker, Ms Prasiddhi Shrestha, a 19-yearold who was also a COVID-19 patient. During this meeting, Prasiddhi not only addressed a number of questions that our IB students had in mind but also gave us some insights on her overall take on the COVID-19 situation. She shared how she is currently focused on fighting against the stigma and discrimination against corona victims, and to raise awareness to help families struggling with COVID-19, and to change mindsets of those who victimize COVID-affected families further. ! We are in the state of quarantine for more than a month now. We all are trying to adjust and move further in our own space. A similar progression is an online class that has begun at Ullens School. First day's sharing of the online teaching plans with our valuable parents and an ice-breaking class on the next day with our dear students have given us an opportunity to create the memories of exploring something new followed by eventual learning, sharing, combating challenges and thereby growing together.

Everything came to a halt due to the Covid-19 pandemic, putting everyone in a situation that no one had anticipated. It became a challenge to the educators in terms of thinking how to move ahead with the students. The only solution to this was by going online. This was more challenging to the Ullens Kindergarteners due to their age which starts from 1.6 to 4.6 years of age. With rigorous meeting and planning, lesson plans were made in such a way that the children would be ready to sit and enjoy the class. On the first day of the class, children were so excited to see their friends after such a long time. Parents are happy and grateful that the school has started the online class; they are there throughout the time helping their children settle down and assisting them in their work. Our stress is relieved by the parent's cooperation. It's been about three weeks since Ullens KG started online class and it is going great at full speed. Children eagerly wait for the next class to start and they ask their teachers about the next day's activity. This is a challenge to the teaching faculty, working from home with fewer resources and materials than what is needed, but our teachers are doing their best to engage the children and to make learning fun, without any stress in a happy and positive environment.

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I'm happy to be a part of a virtual learning community. It is an atypical but a wonderful experience for me. The fact that we miss the face-to-face classes cannot be denied but virtual classes conducted by Ullens School have managed to bring us together. After a lot of challenges in the first few classes, I along with my colleagues have started taking our classes, not as a challenge but rather as an opportunity to relieve ourselves from anxiety and grow ourselves with digital skills, literacy, and ample of learning tools.

Having always been going to school, online classes were quite unusual at the beginning. We had to face a few problems due to technical issues but rather than going to eight hours of school every day, four hours of line classes felt refreshing. Kathmandu valley still gets power cuts which can result in people getting disconnected in the middle of the class or missing out on important lessons. While attending online classes it's difficult to pay attention. Sending assignments to the teacher can also be challenging at times, sometimes the emails don't deliver on time so I have to resend it multiple times. My experience with online class is so far a fun experience. I hope it will keep getting better as we go!

The celebration also included 2 separate class videos capturing the multifaceted curriculum of both the Grade 12 & IBDP students and all of their experiential learning over the last two years.
